PIONEERS OF COMPUTER ART

VOLUME I: The Mavericks

INTRODUCTION

The first computer artists emerged in the Nineteen Sixties and early Seventies. Using the crude technology of their time, these mavericks faced and conquered extraordinary obstacles. Many of today's leading computer artists and scientists cite them as their earliest and most important influences.

From the perspective of the 1990's, at a time when computers are relatively cheap, powerful, and reliable, the achievement of the early computer artists is in danger of being trivialized and forgotten. All of our subjects are of advanced age; it is important to document their story while they are still with us.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Pioneers of Computer Art will consist of a series of VIDEOTAPED INTERVIEWS with approximately ten of the leading early computer artists from America, Europe, and possibly Japan. Among the more than thirty artists currently being considered for inclusion are John Whitney Sr., Chuck Csuri, Ed Emschwiler, Lillian Schwarz, Myron Krueger, and Manfred Mohr. The final artist selection will take place in October of this year. The interview tapes will be edited together with representative samples of the artists' works.

There will be an INTRODUCTORY OVERVIEW which will provide a timeline of important developments in the field of computer imaging from its formative stages up to the present day state-of-the-art. The overview will also concentrate on some of the key scientists, engineers, and other artists who were involved with the development of the medium.

The FINAL PRODUCT will be released both as a sixty-minute videotape as well as videodisc with up to four independent channels of sound. The project will be completed over a one year period. The principal participants are:
