My dear Friends:

I have time only for a brief note to say again how much I enjoyed your company this summer. Your kindness, generosity, intelligence and friendship are very important to me. I enjoyed you more, and felt closer to you, each time we were together. Each of you individually, and your relationship as a couple, is inspiring to me. I get so much out of being with you -- I wish I were in a position to give more in return.

Curiously, I feel I should apologize for my distraction with Kittie, but that's just my binary nature. On the one hand I wanted to be with you to talk in the way we talk, to grow closer in understanding and affection, without the modifications Kittie's presence made necessary. On the other hand I needed to be with her for reasons that are not entirely clear to me yet. Let us say I was lonely in more ways than one and, at this moment in my life, I needed the experiences she made possible. It was a healing, nourishing affair in spite of the difficulties, in spite of the impossibility of communication such as that which I share with you. I learned, I grew.

I feel deeply kindred with you both, that you reflect my true self back to me. You reminded me who I am at a time when I was rather confused and lost, and helped me regain my optimism, courage and self-respect. You made me realize how isolated I am from my true community, from those with whom I can "commune-icate." To live without community is to live without self-knowledge. Thanks to you I feel stronger, healthier and more positive than I have in a very long time. Good thing, too, because I'm completely broke, can pay rent for only one more month, and don't really know what to do about it. But I feel fine anyway...

Enclosed is a check for the videotape, for which I am very grateful. There is also the LSD, two tabs for each of you. They say it's the same as the other but a bit stronger. Hope you're ready to do some serious negotiating with the Great Instructor...I also bought a gram of opium, which I've never experienced before. Soon I shall become acquainted with this legendary character...the dreamer of dreams.

I intend to maintain a steady correspondence with you; there is much that I haven't the time to say right now, and experiences ahead which I will want to share with you. So please let me know where you are in the Land of Enchantment.

Erwin Schrodinger, discoverer of that enigmatic reality known as wave mechanics, said: "The fact that anything is experienced and encountered at all is the most profound occasion for astonishment. Yet this astonishment is itself very astonishing. Surely astonishment and wonder are what we feel on encountering something that differs from what is normal or expected. But we encounter this world only once. We have nothing with which to compare it; how can we approach it with any expectation? Yet we are astonished, puzzled by what we find, even though we're unable to say what we should have found in order not to be astonished, or how the world would have to be constructed in order not to constitute a riddle."

Thanks very much for sending the excellent AFTERIMAGE interview and photo layout. It's beautiful and your thoughts are compelling.

My book THE FUTURE OF DESIRE will be done by the end of September, published next spring.

My current thoughts on the significance of video tools: the extreme case would be, through their use, (1) de-reification of the culture, and (2) re-socialization of autonomous individuals. This would represent a transition from the logic of heteronomy (I'm governed by others: the industrial model) to the logic of autonomy (I govern myself: the post-industrial model).

John Minkowski was just here & said he'll bring me to Buffalo this fall for a lecture. The subject of that talk will be: THE THEORY OF THE OBSERVER -- THE NEW EPISTEMOLOGY AND ITS SIGNIFICANCE FOR MEDIA STUDY.

Dear Steina and Woody:

I want to thank you most sincerely for the generous letter of recommendation you wrote in support of my application for the position of Curator of Film and Video at the Long Beach Museum of Art. However, I've decided to withdraw my application, and I want to explain why.

First, the only reason I considered the job at all was fear of being broke and unemployed -- a circumstance I've endured several times in the seven years I've been working on my new book, and which appears to be imminent once again. However, to take this job would mean to delay indefinitely the completion of my book at a time when I'm very close to finishing. At the very least it would have meant a delay of one full year in getting the book published.

Second, I was overwhelmed by the generosity of the 30 letters of recommendation I received, about a third of them from persons I've never met. I wasn't expecting the enthusiastic response I got. The sincere appreciation of my work as expressed in these letters touched me profoundly and caused me to reconsider my priorities. In fact, the letters have given me the courage to continue working on my book till it's done without compromise. I'm very pleased with this decision and I thank you for helping me make it.

I've enclosed an essay which appears in the current issue of CoEvolution Quarterly. It represents the barest skeleton of ideas in the book. The final text will include about 300 pages of biology and evolutionary theory, and another 100 pages of technological analyses. I've decided to change the title of the book. It will be called The Future of Desire.

Dear Woody and Steina:

Here's some music for you. It was difficult to decide, since I'm not sure about your tastes. So I just went with what currently interests me. In general it tends to be ethnic (or electro-ethnic) and rather moody. A few comments:

"Moods of the World" (Side A)

1. The Goldberg aria is from a transcription for string trio of the entire "variations," by a Russian violinist. I can send the whole thing if you like it.
2. "Diva" is the title of a movie from which this piece was taken. It's an aria from an opera called "La Wally" by Vladimir Cosma. The soprano is Wilhelmina Fernandez.
3. Clannad is a contemporary group from Ireland.
4. The Icelandic hymn is by a composer in Reykjavik whose name is Thorkell Sigurbjornsson. It was arranged and recorded by an American folk quintet who call themselves Fiddle Fever.
5. Arvo Part is Lithuanian. Mort S. knows him. The piece I'm sending you is from a long suite called "Tabula Rasa." I can send it if you want to hear more.
6. I'm crazy about Bulgarian singing. There are four songs from three different albums on the two tapes I've sent to you. The harmonies are beautiful, both ancient and very modern.
7. Norman Salant is a jazz musician/composer. This is his arrangement of a traditional Turkish hymn, "Molih Ta."
8. I'm sure you're familiar with Jon Hassell. This is something he did with David Sylvian.

(Side B)

1. Japan is a contemporary British rock group. This is their gamelan piece.
2. Kate Bush is an avant-pop singer.
3. Popol Vuh is a german "new age" group that does all of Werner Herzog's films.
4. Another amazing Bulgarian chant...
5. Djur-Djura is a popular Algerian female trio.
6. Sukay is a Peruvian folk group
7. Likewise for Kasha Paya
8. from the film "El Norte."
9. Inti Illimani is probably the best-known political/folk group in South America.
10. More from "El Norte"
11. Carl Stone is a Los Angeles composer. This is tape loops.

"Penguin Cafe Orchestra"

This is one of my favorite groups: minimal but whimsical, lyric, sometimes elegiac, always surprising. The selections here are from five different albums.
