he new Armory for the Arts. New-a hard earned word, representing the sweat, dedication and long hours it took to make the Armory into a center for the arts without comparison in the city of Santa Fe. At last the physical forum can match the highest levels of performances and presentation.

It hasn't always been like that. When Rising Sun first leased the building from the State of New Mexico in 1975, it was a huge empty shell, formerly used as a jeans factory. Rising Sun began a slow but steady transformation of the facility. With over 16,000 square feet of space, its scope and function spontaneously grew to meet the needs of an artistic community clamoring for a center. Various non-profit groups were given access to the Armory. Irrepressibly, the focus on the place expanded, and of its own momentum, it has become a center of communication between artists and community, a place for public performances, rehearsals, exhibitions, and educational classes, with studios and offices available. The staff provides administrative resources and technical assistance to artists of all disciplines.

This brochure has been created as a guideline to the new facility. It contains information on who we are, who uses the facility, how you can use the facility, its technical aspects and information on how to become a member of the Armory-and a vital part of its new history.

The facility has a 16 mm six-plate editing machine, film and video equipment, a 'clean' room, a screening room and numerous darkrooms. RSMAC has also sponsored such presentations as the Film is Art series.

The workshop room has a smooth hardwood floor; 3 large mirrors along one wall; is 20' x 30'; and has outside access.







MASTERS OF MODERN SCULPTURE ON FILM

In conjunction with the 1980 Armory/Museum/Festival! Show, Rising Sun Media Arts Center will present two enlightening films, **Masters of Modern Sculpture** on Sat., Oct. 11 and **Fourteen Americans** on Sun., Oct. 12. The Santa Fe Foundry Association, with their dedication to the enrichment of cultural life in Santa Fe, has generously provided a grant to make this possible.

The use of film is especially constructive in viewing the sculpture of the last one hundred years. The three part series, **Masters of Modern Sculpture**, introduces the major sculptors of this century. The documentaries take us on a tour across the globe, from Brancusi's *Endless Columns*, in the Roumanian village of Tirgu-Jiu, to the southern French town of Vallauris, where Picasso installed his *Man With Sheep*, to the remote deserts of Nevada where Michael Heizer built his *Double Negative*. Among those seen in rare exhumed footage and in interviews before their death are August Rodin, Henry Matisse, Alexander Calder, Marcel Duchamp, and David Smith.

The artists at work speak for themselves amid tools and machinery. In a revealing and personal way they describe their techniques and ideas. The film allows us to enter the world of these brilliant sculptors and share with them their work in a way never possible in the past.

On Sunday the film **Fourteen Americans** selects that many artists to represent a cross-section of American art of the 1970's. Their works, a variety of styles and artistic values, reflect the heterogeneity of the decade. Among the fourteen are painters and sculptors. Many of the artists have made photographs, films, videotapes and audiotapes. Some of the activities enlist engineering and construction techniques, others are closer to those of a writer, composing texts or scripts that are central to their art. The sources of inspiration vary from Renaissance painting to lunar explorations.

Much of the work is self-reflective and original in its rejection of artistic values of the past. The film is a dynamic documentation of the eclectic world of art in a decade where individual artists freed themselves from the constraints of a "movement."

Masters of Modern Sculpture will be shown on Sat., Oct. 11 in three parts: Part One, The Pioneers at 5:30 pm; Part Two, Beyond Cubism at 7:00 pm; and Part Three, The New World at 8:30 pm. Tickets for all three parts are \$3.00. Single admissions \$1.50. Fourteen Americans will be shown Sunday, Oct. 12 at 7:00 and 9:00 pm.

FESTIVAL ARCHITECTURAL PROGRAMS

The architectural committee of the Festival of the Arts, headed by Laban W. Wingert with cooperation from the Old Santa Fe Association, has made arrangements to show several houses in the Canyon Road area of Santa Fe's Historical Styles Zone. The Historical Styles committee exists by city ordinance, and tries to protect the delicate relation of Santa Fe's various architectural styles. If architecture is frozen music—as has been written—the traditional Santa Fe styles sing of Spanish guitars, Indian drums, and restless Anglo-Saxon symmetry. Now, after centuries, there is harmony.

Each day during the Festival (October 8-19) a photographic architectural exhibit will be open for viewing at the Armory for the Arts on Old Pecos Trail, between one and six PM. The exhibit will show architectural traditions in Santa Fe between 1876 and the present. Robin Lake has curated the show.

JUROR'S STATEMENT

Dianne Vanderlip, Curator, Denver Art Museum

Ever since moving to the West I've been intrigued with New Mexico's unique position in the arts. Here you have a state with only one and a half million people far from any major industrial or economic center, with only one major airport in the entire state, and yet its well known that the artists working here are among the most interesting in the country and have been for years and years.

I suppose part of the reason for the artistic climate in New Mexico stems simply from the fact that New Mexico is one of the most beautiful places in America and has endless room as well as interesting history and traditions. Certainly the centuries of cultural mixing have created a rich heritage visible everywhere. New Mexico was settled before New York, Boston, or Philadelphia, and its people have created spectacular public art and architecture for thousands of years in the form of petroglyphs, cliff dwellings, and pueblos. The Native American contributions to the arts through their crafts are unparalleled, and the standards those early Americans set are no doubt a primary influence on countless artists.

I agreed to jury the Armory/Museum/Festival Show because I wanted to see firsthand what the contemporary artists are doing. During the three days I spent looking at over 1800 pieces of art I was struck by the incredible variety and high quality of ideas represented in the entries. As the staff of the Museum and the Armory had organized the jurying procedure so that I was given no information regarding the artists' names or backgrounds I had to judge the work solely on its own merit. Certainly a different judge would have selected a different exhibition, but what I was looking for and found were fresh explorations of traditional ideas and energetic testing of new ideas.

Photography, painting, video, sculpture, ceramics, textiles, prints and drawing are all being pursued with independence and commitment. The results, many of which are included in this exhibition, make it clear that the artists of New Mexico are not fighting the old battles of politics and regionalism or the older battle of one style or medium against another, but are instead simply working hard to create very good art. It seems to me that this is the real triumph of the artists of the state...by maintaining their independence they have managed to keep themselves free from the constraints of any predetermined aesthetic imperative and are exploring the images and ideas that are meaningful to them. That surely must be the reason for the energy, quality and uniqueness of the arts in New Mexico.

ARMORY FOR THE ARTS

This is our fourth major art exhibition in the Armory in October and possibly the biggest and best. Previous shows have exhibited artists from all over New Mexico, have been both juried and invitational, have been all media and just sculpture, and have been widely viewed by the several thousands of people attending the art shows during the Festival of the Arts.

This year's show is especially exciting to us not only because of the high quality of the work being shown but because of the cooperation between the three sponsors of the show. We'd also like to mention our appreciation of the hard task put to Dianne Vanderlip in selecting the show from the over 1800 submitted entries.
