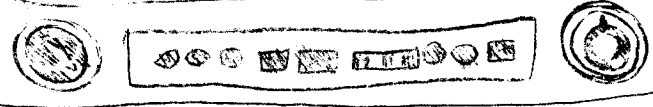
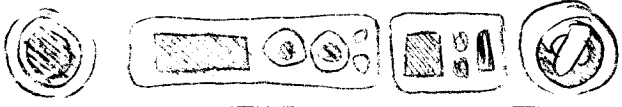

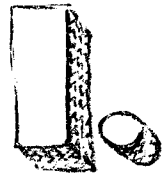
Saturday afternoon workshops in which young people ages 8-12 can explore the uses of video by making, directing, and starring in their own television shows!

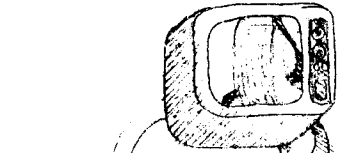




### VIDEO FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

### VIDEO SYNTHESIS WORKSHOP

Conducted by Walter Wright, resident artist at ETC, this session includes lecture/demo of the techniques of color synthesis and image manipulation. Selected video tape illustrations will be used, 'hands-on' experience in small groups.

**COST: \$165 per full day, plus mileage**

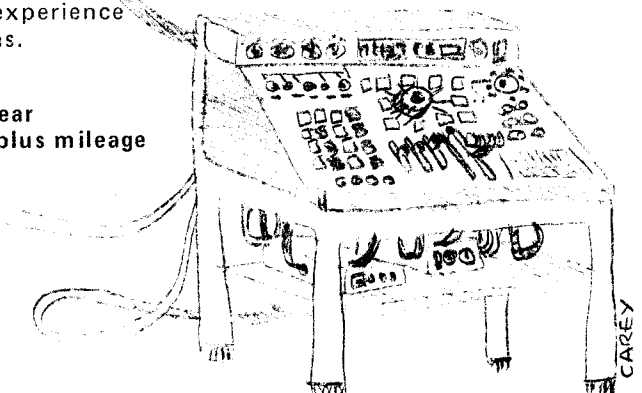
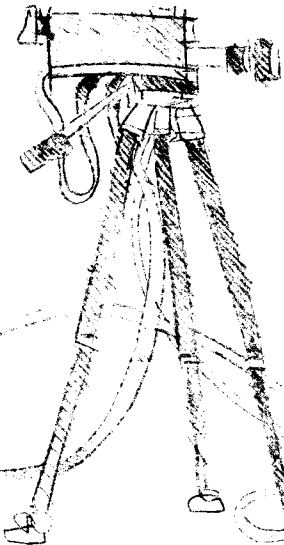
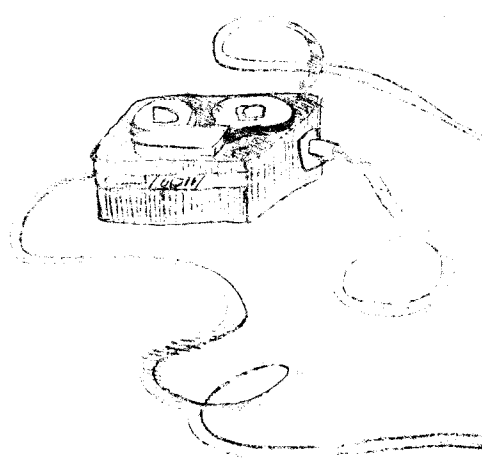


### BLACK & WHITE IMAGERY WORKSHOP

## INFORMATION, WORKS AND ACTIVITIES

### Experimental Television Center

#### Permanent Systems

##### Untitled Activity – Peer Bode

Playback of picture and sound waveform images recorded of Everson's permanent collection.

##### Frames – Ralph Hocking

A series of frames from each of twelve videotapes made by Ralph Hocking and Sherry Miller from 1970-75 are presented photographically to allow perception of discrete image construction. Movement is reintroduced to each series through the presenting device.

##### Work For Round Screen – Ralph Hocking

A repetition of shape.

##### Jones Graphics – David Jones

This set of graphics presents a conceptual understanding of the functioning of the Jones colorizer. The systems approach reveals the parameters of this image making system.

##### McArthur Graphics – Don McArthur

A visual display of the computer-controlled video synthesizer system, its functions and processes. The lecture presentation of November 23 will explore the system in detail.

##### Video Drawing – collaboration

One perception of a video image; one representation of a video image.

##### Synthesizer

The Jones Video Synthesizer, developed for the Center by David Jones with support from the New York State Council on the Arts, is a four channel colorizer with keying capacity. It is an art making tool the capabilities of which include the mixing of up to four live or recorded camera images and the generation and mixing of electronic colors. The system is the basis for the workshops, performances and presentation to occur during the month and will also be installed in the Green Room with a color monitor matrix.

#### Temporary Systems

##### *November 5 - 11 Hourly*

##### Three Pillars – Meryl Blackman

Three pillars of monitors display black and white

videotapes emphasizing movement and spatial relationships. The position of the pillars with respect to the total spatial environment will be altered every three days to provide several different experiences of the tapes.

##### *November 5 - 14 Hourly*

##### Circle Cycle – Sherry Miller

An installation providing a variety of perspectives on a familiar activity.

##### Alfred Skerritt - A Portrait – Evangelos Dousmanis and Melanie Salzberg

A multi-media portrait of an early jazz musician and his music. Skerritt was very active in the development of jazz and Latin jazz in the United States from the early 1920's through the 1960's. He is now retired and living in New York City. Slides and photographs from the early jazz era are reproductions from Skerritt's original collection. There is also recorded music from that period including an unreleased Fats Waller tune. A videotape will be presented in the tape program.

##### *November 12 - 18 Hourly*

##### Meeting in Space – Meryl Blackman

A two channel work constructed from material from broadcast television coverage of the Apollo-Soyuz space shot. Two monitors display two tapes simultaneously creating additional meetings in space.

##### *November 16 - 21 Hourly*

##### Three Channel Piece Ft (O\* Δ) – Walter Wright

A preliminary study to identify the limits of the function Ft using three simultaneous channels of video. Channel one uses the image of a circle, channel two, a triangle and three, a triangle inscribed in a circle. Ft represents the various effects obtained using a sequencer and the possible interactions between channels. It is a study in fragmentation.

##### *November 23, 24 Hourly*

##### Sunsets – Jane Wright

Electronic sunsets on a monitor matrix.

##### *November 26 - 28*

##### Act Requiring Maintenance – Neil Zusman

An historical work requiring multiple viewpoints.

## WORKSHOPS, PERFORMANCES AND LECTURE

##### *November 6, 7 2:00p.m.*

##### Synthesis I – Peer Bode

Two one day workshops will provide an introduction to video synthesis systems. The format will include live video synthesizing, tape showings and discussion. The 'reality' of the electronic image will be explored as well as the notion of image as process/art as process.

*November 9 - 11 7:30 p.m.*

Synthesis II — Peer Bode

This workshop will allow for an extended involvement with video processes and includes three days of live synthesis, tape showings and discussions as well as an opportunity for individuals to do 'hands-on' work with the video synthesizer.

*November 16 - 18 7:30 p.m.*

Synthesis III — Walter Wright

Using the Jones colorizer this workshop concerns predicting the behavior of the system and the image, re-scan techniques, genlock techniques and the theory of electronic color.

These workshops are designed for people with an interest in the processes and concepts of video art and image making. The information and experiences are not intended to be sequential. Information presented in earlier workshops is not necessary for an understanding of later ones since each workshop approach differs. However, the workshops combined are quite comprehensive. Illuminations — Walter Wright

An improvisational performance work using an orchestrated flow of images presented on a matrix of color monitors. Representational camera images and synthesizer images are processed in real time with the Jones synthesizer.

*November 23 7:30 p.m.*

Computer-Controlled Synthesis — Don McArthur

A discussion of technical and aesthetic considerations in the design and use of a computer-controlled video system. The presentation includes slides and a videotape of images generated by such a system.

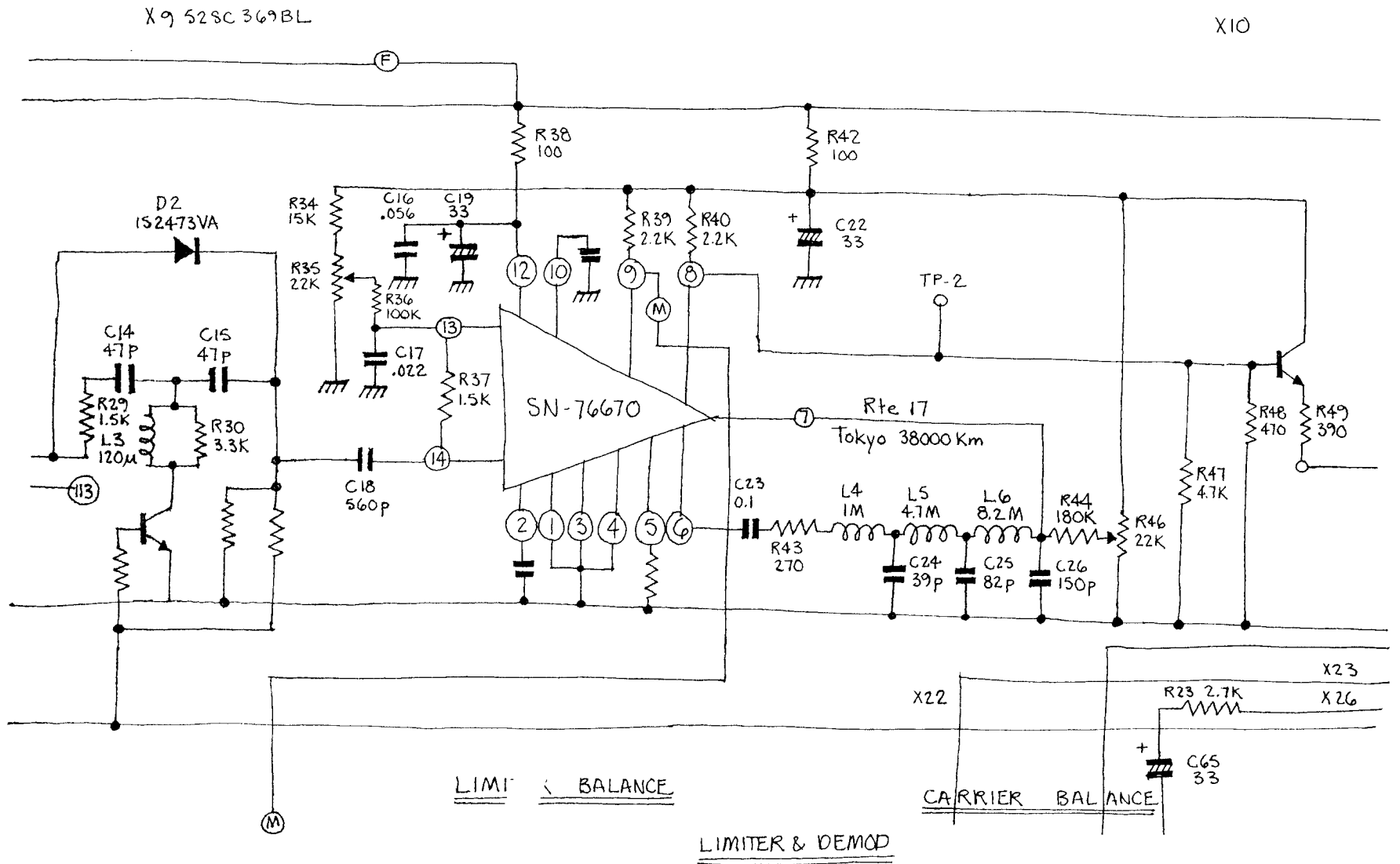
The EXPERIMENTAL TELEVISION CENTER is a video facility dedicated to the production and study of electronic imaging.
