LECTURE/SCREENING BY AIR SOKHI WAGNER

Women's Studio Workshop's first film artist in residence will show a number of her works in Super 8 and 16 mm at WSW on MONDAY, JUNE 23 AT 8 P.M. She will also discuss how experimental film deals with issues of representation and how images of women are articulated in film. Among the works she will show are ZONE (S8, b&w, sil, 8 mins.); FALL IN A FAINT (16mm, b&w, 6 mins.); and CORRIDOR, a work-in-progress.

Ms. Wagner will be working in WSW's newly established post-production 16mm editing facility for the month of June. The A-i-R program is offered to women filmmakers who are close to the final editing stages of a new work; Sokhi is working on CORRIDOR, a film about a woman wandering through the abstracted world of a dream.

Sokhi Wagner, a New York City resident, is a graduate of the Boston School of the Museum of Fine Arts and Tufts University. From 1982-1983 she participated in the Whitney Independent Study Program. She was an artist-in-residence at Rochester Visual Studies Workshop in 1985. Her work was shown at the New York Downtown Film Festival in 1985 and at the Makkom Super-8 Festival in Amsterdam in 1984.

WOMEN AND TECHNOLOGY. This show will feature two components exploring the relationship of women and technology. Curated by computer artist Barbara Nessim, the exhibit "Women and Computers" will feature the work of six artists working in this medium. The video component, curated by staff member Ariel Dougherty. will include a six monitor video installation "The West" by Steina Vasulka and four video screenings (see film and video listing). JUNE 14-JULY 10. A lecture by computer/light sculptor Barbara Helpern will take place JULY 11 at 8 p.m. Halpern states, "I explore various forms of light, working with micro computers that control the timing and intensity for the works."

Works on paper by NANCY KORCZAKOWSKI and the prints and collage of PATTY TYROL will be on display at Inskirts Gallery JULY 12-AUGUST 7. An Ellenville resident, painter Korczakowski responds colorfully to the undulating patterns of the Catskills. Tyrol's work combines a range of printmaking techniques with collage elements in subtle, startling and always refreshing ways. Opening reception July 12, 2-4 p.m.

AUGUST 9-SEPTEMBER 4. The works of SUE BUCHOLZ and NANCY AZARA are featured in this exhibit. Bucholz's work describes organic forms through intricate woodcuts and impressionistic pastels. Azara, of New York City, uses mixed media to create emotive relief sculpture and artists' books. Opening reception August 9, 2-4 p.m.

Summer Arts Institute

JULY 14 - 18: LEARNING TO PAY ATTENTION (ART FOR LIFE)

Paying attention is the basis for art and for life. Once we learn how to clearly pay attention, we can do anything that we want and we can consider it creative. Eventually, just doing the dishes can also be a satisfying, complete and total experience.

This workshop is for those interested in working on their inner self, using visualization, concentration, silence, slow motion eating/walking, endurance, etc. as clearing techniques, and it is for those willing to communicate what they are experiencing using performances, cooking, singing, writing, etc., as possible forms of expression.

PAPER AND BOOKS: SEQUENCING AND DESIGN

Each artist will design a book, bringing her/his own imagery and narrative ideas into play. Students will plan imagery and its movement from sheet to sheet and will then design papers that they will make and use. The basic vocabulary of paper making — sheet forming, casting and embedding — will be introduced, and students will be invited to color pulps and experiment with different fibers.

PRINTMAKING: ETCHING

The growth and refinement of personal imagery through the medium of the intaglio print. Students will experiment with all intaglio techniques: etching, dry point, engraving, collography, embossing and mezzotint. A sampling of traditional and contemporary techniques in black and white and color will be offered, including chine colle, viscosity and multiple color plates. Beginners welcome.

JULY 21 - 25

LETTERPRESS PRINTING

This hands-on workshop will present the basic skills of letterpress printing: how to hand-set type, compose broadsides and print on a platen press. Several projects of varying scale will be produced using traditional and non-traditional typographical approaches and materials, including handmade paper. Bring ideas and copy to be printed, i.e. poems, prose, announcements.

ANN KRESGE

PAPER AS OBJECT: A SCULPTURAL APPROACH

Using pulp in liquid form, students will explore the objectness of the material. Direct casting using simple molds such as a deckle frame, a plaster bas-relief and a latex structure will be investigated. The relief structure will be evaluated in terms of contemporary art. Color techniques will be explored as well as multiple casting configurations.

The course will focus on handmade paper as a uniquely American art form, exploring its role in contemporary art.

SUZANNE ANKER

JULY 28 - AUGUST 1 AQUA SCREENING

Learn the state-of-the-art serigraphic process using water-based inks, and produce permanent, fine-art silk screen prints without the toxicity of solvents. This hands-on seminar provides you with all the information necessary to set up a water-based printing studio, including equipment. Participants learn stencil techniques from hand drawn/painted to photographic as well as clean-up without solvents. A thorough exploration of ink varieties, bases extenders and retarders will be covered as well as rag and commercial paper varieties appropriate for water-based inks.

NANCY McGEE

PAPERMAKING - A CREATIVE APPROACH

Workshop will cover beginning to advanced techniques in the use of handmade paper as an artistic medium. Emphasis will be placed on the development of each individual's unique imagery using colored cotton pulps with techniques of collage through multiple couching, lamination, embedding and direct pulp painting.

TANA KELLNER

AUGUST 4 · 8 TEXTILE PRINTING

This workshop will provide a foundation for the techniques of silk screen printing on fabric. Using dye-like, permanent water-based inks, systems of designing and printing patterns in repeat will be explored. Photo silk screen will be used primarily, but other stencil methods will also be covered. Each participant will have the opportunity to work on one large and several small projects. The large project will be a two-color design printed in registration on several yards of fabric. The smaller projects will offer a chance to print with many colors on one piece.

SHANNA LINN

BOOKBINDING

Using a variety of papers and simple hand tools, participants will construct a series of small books based on historical models, both Oriental and Western: side-sewn, accordionfold, single and multi-section bindings. Several uncomplicated portfolio structures will also be taught.

BARBARA MAURIELLO

AUGUST 11 · 15 WOODCU'T PRINTING

This workshop will present woodcut printmaking techniques. Demonstrations and
discussions will cover wood selection and
preparation and different cutting methods.
There will be a variety of woods and papers
to choose from, including a selection of
hand-made paper, and students will be encouraged to experiment. Various approaches
to color printing will be introduced, and
students will try multiple block color printing.

HESTER STINNETT

MONOPRINTING

The monoprint concept reviewed and renewed emphasizing and utilizing the advantages of printing processes with the freedom of painting, drawing and collage. Develop and explore the effects of stencils, paper and plastic plate materials, modified inks and painting mediums along with the principles of viscosity and relief printing. The aesthetic,

historical and practical applications of monoprinting, and the artists who do it, are discussed.

AUGUST 18 - 22 CALLIGRAPHY: STAYING WITH THE EDGE

An intensive study of the Renaissance Humanist Hand, one of the most beautiful and legible of western alphabets. Class time will alternate between a study of the letterforms — developing rhythm and steadiness — and layout design — how the letters are placed on the page. We will also explore the use of the pointed brush as an expressive contrast to the pen. Bring texts that have personal meaning. No previous experience necessary.

BOOK OBJECTS/ARTISTS' BOOKS

The course will explore the concepts and media of Artists' Books beginning with a discussion/definition of the term and an understanding of the overall sense of the Artist's Book as a ritual of relationships. The making of a book object can be a complementary occupation/expression of other art forms. Each artist, according to her/his own personality and orientation finds an original solution to the concept of Book. To accelerate this process, we will simultaneously work on many books - as a group and as individuals. Through accelerating production, we will explore a variety of book concepts (narration, documentation, symbolic iconography) as well as a variety of materials (cloth, paper, wood, found objects, etc.) and techniques.

A fascinating exploration of the relationship of various types of hunger and their relationship to food and to romantic situations. Zebras are a visual metaphor to human behavior. "PETRIFIED MAN" (1981, 28 mins) by Denise Bostrom, Based on a Eudora Welty short story, the teleplay shows people from a small town fabricate stories working the mundane into the melodramatic. "SEI CHIEN: GODDESS IN FLIGHT" (1983, 23 mins) by Christine Choy. This distinctly rendered work, examines the generational conflicts between an older woman, newly migrated from China and a younger, more westernized woman.

"MY HUSBAND HIT ME" (1983, 30 secs) by Lynne Smilow. Made as a public service announcement to publicize the state's domestic violence hotline.

"YOU NEVER LEFT" (1984, 12:30 mins) by Laura Davis. An exploration of the public and personal experience of rape, using poetry and sound structuring with real and processed imagery.

"TECHNOLOGY/TRANSFORMATION: WONDER WOMAN" (1978, 7 mins) & "POP-POP VIDEO: GENERAL HOSPITAL/OLYMPIC WOMEN SPEED SKATE" (1980, 6 mins) by Dara Birnbaum. These are fasted paced manipulations of TV "readymades" coupled with rock and disco music.

"TRAVELS IN THE COMBAT ZONE" (1983, 30 mins) by Doris Chase. A stunning and precise marriage of image and poetic

meaning surrounds a woman's view of the realities of the combat zones of cities.



"BENEATH THE SKIN" (1981, 11 mins.) by Cecilia Condit. The narrator struggles to clarify the story of a murder victim but can only succeed through personalization.

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
